1.	WHEREAS, Current congressional districts often were created to serve for the
2.	benefit of one party in that state's congressional elections, called
3.	"gerrymandering;" and
4.	WHEREAS, This has led to unfair advantages in most congressional districts for
5.	one party and reduced the competitiveness of the parties; and
6.	WHEREAS, This lack of competitiveness has reduced the accountability of
7.	members of congress to the people, minimizing democracy and allowing
8.	gridlock and polarization to occur in the government; and
9.	WHEREAS, The Supreme Court ruled gerrymandering based on race illegal in 199
10.	with the case Miller v. Johnson, arguing it was not equal under the
11.	Fourteenth Amendment; and
12.	WHEREAS, This argument of inequality can be applied to beliefs under the First
13.	Amendment, making all gerrymandering unconstitutional; now, therefore,
14.	be it
15.	RESOLVED, That the Congress hereby assembled recommends that states redrav
16.	their congressional districts along county lines to avoid granting one party
17.	an advantage.

13		geopolitical gap; now, therefore, be it
14	RESOLVED,	That the Congress here assembled shall call for a North Atlantic Council
15		emergency meeting to recommend the removal of Turkey from NATO
16		and the invitation of Israel to NATO.



A Bill to Prohibit Alcohol Advertising

1. BE IT EN	ACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2. Section 1.	Broadcasting Alcohol commercials will be prohibited to display on
3.	television channels and advertise on radio stations.
4. Section 2.	Definitions-
5.	A) Alcohol- a clear liquid that has a strong smell, that is a
6.	substance in liquors (such as beer, whiskey, wine)
7.	B) Commercial- a paid advertisement or promotional
8.	announcement.
9.	C) Advertise- to announce or praise (a product, service, etc.) in
10.	some public medium of communication in order to induce people
11.	to buy or use it.
12. Section 3.	The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) will prohibit alcohol
13.	commercials from broadcasting on over-the-air channels and radio
14.	stations on a daily basis. Failure to comply with such commercials will
15.	result in a fine of \$500,000 on the broadcasting company for each
16.	instance.
17. Section 4.	This bill is to take effect in 12 months
18. Section 5.	All laws in conflict with this bill are hereby declared null and void.

Restoring Democracy Act

BE IT ENACTED THAT BY THE UNITED STATES CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- 1 Article 1: Any U.S. citizen who is 18 years old or older will now automatically be
- 2 registered to vote when they receive a driver's license or state ID.
- 3 Article 2: U.S. citizen is defined as any individual born in the United States or
- any individual who has immigrated to the United States and gained
- 5 citizenship.
- 6 Article 3: The United States Department of Justice shall oversee the enforcement
- 7 and implementation of this bill.
- 8 Article 4: This bill shall take effect immediately after passage.
- 9 Article 5: All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.



A RESOLUTION TO DRONE OUT THE DRONES

1.	WHEREAS,	Armed drones are attack aircraft flown by a noncombatant operator, and
2.		used by multiple nations to provide support and take out military targets at
3.		low risk to the operator; and
4.	WHEREAS,	When drone strikes take place, they may hit populated areas and result in
5.		high civilian casualties and cause damage to non-military targets; and
6.	WHEREAS,	The elimination of armed drones will result in lower civilian casualties and
7.		damage in populated areas that may be near military and/or strategic
8.		locations; and
9.	WHEREAS,	Downed drones could fall into the hands of enemies of the United States,
10		giving them possession of advanced military grade weapons; therefore be it
11	.RESOLVED	, That the United States Congress shall move that all UN member states
12	•	phase out the usage of drones as attack aircraft by 2020. Members will
13		only need to phase out drones that are designed or modified to carry
14	••	weaponry; surveillance drones will not be affected by this phase out.



A Bill To Renew The Assault Weapon Ban

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1** That there are a total of 3,750,000 assault rifles in the United States.
- 3 **SECTION 2** Since the assault rifle's creation in WW2 was to kill as many people as
- 4 possible, it provides no practical use in home protection, sport, or recreational use.
- 5 **SECTION 3** Since 1982, 23 mass shootings involved assault weapons creating a high
- 6 death toll in a short period of time. An average of 100 people per year die from mass
- 7 shootings.
- 8 **SECTION 4** This bill would target semi-automatic and other military style guns by
- 9 prohibiting the manufacture of these weapons for consumer use while placing
- 10 restrictions on existing assault weapons.
- 11 **SECTION 5** This bill shall take effect in 60 days.
- 12 **SECTION 6** All laws in conflict with this bill are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Pull the Sweet Tooth

BE IT ENACTED BY THE UNITED STATES CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	The amount of sugar included in processed food and drink products will be
2		hereby lowered.
3	SECTION 2.	Processed food and drink products will be defined as the combination of two or
4		more substances manufactured for the purpose of human consumption. This bill
5		will enforce the following standards
6		A. For every product, the total amount of sugar, as shown on the label,
7		cannot exceed 10% of the total product mass.
8		B. Food labels must now include a percentage for the Daily Value of sugar.
9		C. All products in conflict with this legislation will be subject to an additional
0		500% sin tax.
1	SECTION 3.	The Food and Drug Administration will oversee the implementation of this bill.
2	SECTION 4.	This bill will go into effect on January 1, 2017.
2	SECTION 5	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.



A Resolution to Regulate Private Military Corporations

- 2. global security; and

- 6. expertise as our own military; and
- 7. Whereas, PMC's are huge, unregulated corporations; now, therefore, be it
- 8. Resolved, By the Student Congress Assembled that: PMC's be regulated by
- 9. the Federal Government.
